Why Join Cub Scouts?

- Your time is valuable. More than ever, today's families struggle to find time to spend together. Cub Scouting helps to support your family by providing ready-made opportunities for you and your son to do things together.
- Your son needs to belong to a group of boys his own age. Through this sense of belonging, he
 builds his self-esteem and learns to get along with others. As a parent, you want to be
 assured that the groups that your boy joins will teach values consistent with good
 citizenship, character development, and physical fitness. The Boy Scouts of America has been
 weaving these lifetime values into fun and educational activities since 1910.
- In a society where your son is taught that winning is everything, Cub Scouting teaches him to "do his best" and to be helpful to others.
- Scouting teaches family values and works to strengthen your relationship with your son. Scouting activities can bring added value to the time you already have with your son.
- He will learn to live by the code of "On my honor."

How Much Does Scouting Cost?

Pack annual dues are collected once a year and total \$135. This also includes a subscription to the great magazine *Boys' Life*. Your den leader may ask for additional dues for den-specific activities. Many of the events that we offer are free but there may be additional fees for some activities that are offered, such as our camping trips.

Paying for the Fun is Easy with Popcorn!

Our Pack holds one main fundraiser every year in the Fall where we sell Trails End popcorn. This helps provide a quality program for Scouts and families: the money goes towards the maintaining of the Pack, awards, our annual Pinewood Derby, special ceremonies such as Blue and Gold, and Advancement. It directly lowers the cost of activities for our Scout families and results in more free activities.



The sale is simple and very profitable, which makes paying for Scouting easy. We're excited for your participation in our popcorn fundraiser!

What do I need to buy?

Handbook

Each rank has their own rank-specific handbook: the Lion Handbook, Tiger Handbook, Wolf Handbook, Bear Handbook, and Webelos Handbook.



Uniform

Our Lion Scouts wear a simple uniform consisting of the Lion t-shirt and hat.

For Tigers and above, The *Field Uniform* (sometimes called *Class A*) is the formal Cub Scout uniform which consists of:



- Cub Scout shirt
- Cub Scout pants
- Cub Scout belt and buckle
- Cub scout socks
- Cub Scout hat specific to rank

Upon joining and each year after, the Pack will provide each Scout with the rank-specific neckerchief and the slide that goes around it.

Webelos in our Pack may wear the tan and olive uniform of the Scouts BSA.



How does cub Scouting work?

Scouts participate in den meetings, a monthly Pack meeting, and other Scout events and Pack activities. This program is run entirely by unpaid volunteers, which are parents just like you that have Scouts in the program.

One unique thing about Cub Scouting is that you, as his family, join in on the program with your son, and you will help him along the way. The family is the basis of Cub Scouting, and Cub Scouts exist to support your family and help enrich your family time together. Your son's success in Cub Scouting depends on you!

What is a den?

Your son will be a part of a den, a small group of boys in the same grade level, with two registered and trained adult leaders. The boys have a different handbook at each grade level (rank), with suggested activities that are age-appropriate for their developmental level. As your boy advances through these books by working on activities with you, he will earn belt loops, pins and patches that can be displayed on his uniform.

The Path to Advancement

Cub Scouts need to complete seven **Adventures** from their handbooks to earn their rank. After this, they can go on to complete as many of the remaining adventures as they wish.

Lions, Tigers, Wolves and Bears are awarded with Adventure loops which can be worn on their belts. Webelos are awarded with Adventure pins which can be worn on the Webelos colors or hat.

Pack Meetings

The **Cub Scout Pack** is made up of all the **dens**, which meet monthly at the Pack meeting, led by the **Cubmaster**. There are games and activities, skits, songs, ceremonies, and presentation of badges that boys earned during the month. This is where families - not just parents, but siblings, too - can see the achievements of their Cub Scout.

Pack activities

Our Pack offers year round activities, and community involvement, which has continually earned us the highest *Quality Unit Award*. With all the activities that we do, we give our Scouts opportunities to earn the Outdoor Activity Award, National Summertime Pack award, Outdoor Ethics Awareness Award, World Conservation award, and 'High Adventure' Activity awards, to name just a few. Here are some of Pack 527's many activities:

Pinewood Derby - You can build and race a model car with your son.

Blue and Gold Banquet - This is Cub Scouting's birthday party in February, which celebrates the birthday of Scouting.

Camping and overnighters - Our Pack organizes several family camping trips and overnighters during the year that introduce your family to the camping experience, and we encourage you to come and join in! In addition, our district runs an exciting Cub Scout Day Camp every summer that includes archery, BB guns, swimming, crafts, games, sports, songs and skits. Moreover, both our district and council (WLACC) run Cub Scout-Parent and Family camping weekends several times a year in different locations such as Emerald Bay on Catalina island, Camp Whitsett in the Sequoia National Forest and local Camp Josepho. You can even join in with activities run by other districts and councils - the choice is endless!

Hiking - We have many hikes throughout the year which vary by difficulty and distance. Our Hiking Chair tracks each Scouts' mileage from Pack and den hikes so that we can award patches at 5 and 10 miles, and then for every 10 miles after that the scout completes. When a Scout reaches 10 miles, they will receive a hiking staff at one of our ceremonies.

Biking - Pack 527 offers several bike rides many times during the year. Don't forget - all riders (Scouts, siblings and parents/guardians) on any outing must wear a helmet! We also award a special patch for scouts who participate in bike rides, and mile rockers from 10 miles onwards.

Service Projects - We participate in food drives, conservation projects, and other community activities.

Field trips and Special Outings- Great ways to learn more about the people and places in your community.

Training

The Boy Scouts of America offers convenient training for everyone—parents, leaders, and youth members. As a new parent, you can learn all about Cub Scouting and the wonderful year-round adventure your Cub Scout is about to experience. All den leaders and assistant den leaders will need to be registered and trained prior to starting their den meetings in August. Log on to *my.scouting.org*, create a MyScouting account and get started!

Youth Protection

Child abuse is a serious problem in our society, and unfortunately, it can occur anywhere, even in Scouting. Youth safety is of paramount importance to Scouting. For that reason, the BSA continues to create barriers to abuse beyond what have previously existed in Scouting.

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on providing the most secure environment possible for its youth members. To maintain such an environment, the BSA has developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies, and provides parents and leaders with numerous online and print resources for the Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, and Venturing programs.

We encourage all parents to take the BSA's Youth Protection training. This training is required for all BSA registered volunteers and must be renewed annually.

You Are Not Alone!

Cub Scout Pack 527 is part of a much bigger scouting picture!



Boy Scouts of America (BSA) is subdivided into different local 'councils': we are part of the **Western Los Angeles County Council** (WLACC) and the insignia for this is worn on the left shoulder of the uniform.

Our Pack is a member of the **Bill Hart District** which, along with five other geographic districts, make up the WLACC council. Each district helps support their units in providing a successful and high-quality program. An employee of the local council - a district executive - is assigned to assist the units in your district.

Each district also has a volunteer team called the commissioner staff. They are a service team that checks on the program 'health' of





your Pack, and they are a communication link between your Pack and the local council. A commissioner is assigned specifically to assist your unit.

All leaders need training to be effective. Your district provides online or instructor-led training for adult volunteers in how to be a successful leader.

Our Pack belongs to the *American Legion Post 507* who are our **chartered organization.** The Boy Scouts of America (BSA) charter each organization to operate a Scouting unit. The role of each chartered organization is to approve leadership, help secure a meeting place, and make sure that the Pack works within the guidelines and policies of their organization as well as those of the BSA.

Glossary

Advancement. The process by which a Scout meets certain requirements and earns recognition.

Adventure. The basic unit of advancement required to achieve the Tiger, Wolf, Bear, Webelos, and Arrow of Light ranks. Adventures are either required or elective; seven must be completed for each rank advancement.

Adventure loop. A recognition device for Cub Scouts seeking the Lion, Tiger, Wolf and Bear ranks. The loops are used to denote having achieved elective and required adventures. The loops are designed to fit on the Cub Scout web belt.

Adventure pin. A recognition device for Cub Scouts seeking the Webelos and Arrow of Light ranks. The pins are used to denote having achieved elective and required adventures. The pins may be worn on the Webelos colors or on the front of the Webelos cap.

Arrow of Light Award. Highest rank in Cub Scouting. The only Cub Scout badge that may be worn on the Scouts BSA or leader uniform.

Baden-Powell, Robert Stephenson Smyth. Founder of the worldwide Scouting movement. Known as Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell, Chief Scout of the World, and B-P.

Be Prepared. The motto of Boy Scouting.

Buddy system. One part of the Safe Swim Defense plan. Swimmers of like ability are paired, check in and out of the water together, and stay within 10 feet of each other during a swim. The buddy system is

also used in other Scouting activities for safety reasons.

Chartered organization. A community organization that has been granted an annual charter by the Boy Scouts of America to use the program of the Boy Scouts of America. Responsible for the selection of leaders in the organization's Scouting programs.

Commissioner. A volunteer Scouter, representing the district or council, who works as a friend and mentor to Scouting units to help them succeed.

Council. A geographically defined administrative organization, tasked with delivering the programs of the Boy Scouts of America to the community organizations within its borders.

Cubmaster. The top volunteer position in each Cub Scout Pack. Responsible for planning the monthly Pack meetings and working with the Pack committee to make sure the Pack is moving together and in the right direction

Den. This is the name given to smaller, working groups of Cub Scouts (typically 6 to 8 boys). Dens are organized by age and/or grade. In large Packs, there may be more than one same-age and/or -grade den. Dens usually have a number (Den 1, Den 2, etc).

Den chief. A Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, or Venturer selected by the Cubmaster to help the den leader lead the activities of a Cub Scout den.

Denner. A Cub Scout or Webelos Scout who is elected or selected to be the temporary youth leader of his den. Denners can change every few weeks, monthly, or other term so every Scout gets leadership experience.

District. A geographic administrative committee of volunteers within a council, organized to serve the Scouting units within its borders.

District executive. A career Scouting professional who works as a staff member of the local council. They are assigned specific communities within the council. Sometimes a district executive is referred to as a *DE*.

Friends of Scouting (FOS). An annual opportunity for Scouters and interested people in the community to be identified with the local council through their financial support and influence in the expansion of the council program.

Pack. The larger group a Cub Scout belongs to beyond the den. All Packs have numbers that identify them (*Pack 527*, for example). Packs usually consist of more than one den, and are commonly referred to as a scouting unit.

Pack committee. A group of registered Scouting volunteers who serve as the

administrative support for the Cub Scout Pack. It consists of at least three members, including a committee chair. The committee assists with tasks such as program planning, recordkeeping, correspondence, finances, advancements, training, public relations, and membership and registration.

Roundtable. A monthly gathering of adult scouting leaders in the district designed to provide help with program planning, training, and other useful tools.

Scouter. A registered adult member of the BSA who serves in a volunteer or professional capacity.

Webelos Scouts. The part of Cub Scouting for fourth- and fifth-grade (or 9- and 10-year-old boys). The word comes from We'll Be Loyal Scouts.

Unit. Term used to designate any one of the following: Pack, patrol, troop, squad, or team.
